VISITING FACULTY

Dr. Marcellus Barksdale

Dr. Barksdale received his Ph.D. from Duke University in 1978 in Oral and Afro American History. He is a specialist in Civil Rights and Afro-American Southern Communities. He is presently Associate Professor of History at Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia; Executive Director of the State Committee on Life and History of Black Georgia; and one of the Assistant Editors of the Journal of Negro History.

Mr. Jim Czarniecki, III

A native of San Francisco he has lived in most sections of the country. He attended Xaverius College, Antwerp, Belgium, and Wabash College, Indiana, graduating with a B.A. in Physics. Continuing his education at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and Columbia College, he concentrated in photography, holography and kinetic art.

Mr. Czarniecki, studied the history of photography at the Humanities Research Center, University of Texas at Austin, the International Museum of Photography at George Eastman House, among others. He moved to Jackson in 1976 after his appointment as Director of the Mississippi Museum of Art, located in the Mississippi Arts Center/Davis Planetarium.
